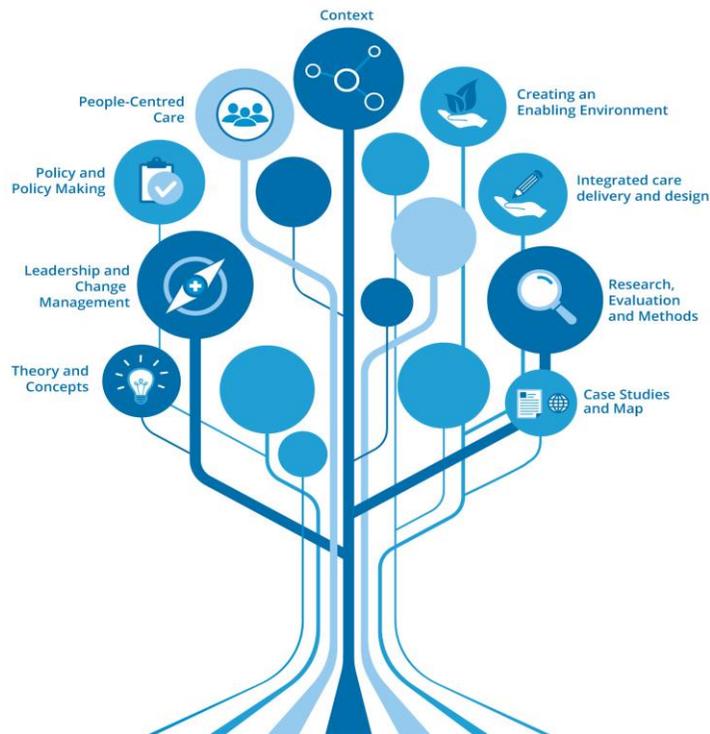

Development of compassionate communities is part of the broader initiative of the public health approach to palliative and end of life care. Ambition 6 of the national guidance document for end of life care - communities are prepared to help - can be used by hospital teams to make best use of community support.
